Photography in My Garden – Starlings in Flight Roger Hance FRPS

With the country in lockdown, I am forced to concentrate on photographing things in our garden. As it is still not warm enough for many butterflies, moths and insects, I decided to concentrate on some of the birds that we have. Although we live on the outskirt of a town and only have a small garden, we do get quite a lot of birds visiting our feeders, fat balls and free offerings. We have House Sparrow, Blackbird, Robin, Dunnock, Wren, Wood Pigeon, Collared Dove, Sparrowhawk and lots of Starlings.



This is our garden. The shot is taken from our bedroom window. It's not a large garden and we live just on the outskirts of Colchester. We feed the birds regularly, which is why we get so many to visit us. I decided to use our garden shed as a hide. The birds are used to it and it wasn't a difficult job to get them to come close enough for me to photograph them.



I wanted the birds to fly to a small plastic tray, filled with a mixture of soaked bread and lard. I needed something small, rather than a bird table, because I wanted to restrict the area they could land on. That way I could roughly guess where they would be flying to. I positioned it about 15 feet in front of the shed. Because our garden faces east, I can only really photograph in the morning, because then the light comes up behind the shed.

Another advantage of having a small pot with the food, is that if it had more than two or three birds on it, there was no more room for any more. When this happened, I would often get a bird hovering above the pot^{photo8.} Because I focused manually on where I predicted the birds would fly, I got a lot of shots where the bird was not quite in focus. This is unavoidable but, if you persevere, you should end up with some that are perfectly in focus.

AWARDS FOR PHOTOGRAPHIC MERIT (APM)

We had arranged dozens of 1:1 meetings with Club Members at the Photography Show to help them

to improve their APM entries. The Show, of course, had to be postponed and at least two Federation Awards Workshops were similarly cancelled. To help fill this gap, I have assembled a group of people who are prepared to look at potential APM entries online and offer their advice.

The service was offered first to those who had booked for the Photography Show and to those who have already entered for an Adjudication in 2020. Many of them have taken up the offer, and you can see some comments in the boxes. We still have some spare capacity and I am now opening the offer to any of our readers who want to apply. If you are preparing to enter, or are thinking about entering, "My Adviser gave me his comments on my pictures. He supported his comments with a selection of my images that he had edited to illustrate his critique. I did find this to be very helpful. It's something that could not be done on an Advisory Day and it just seemed a great thing to do. This has been a very helpful experience and I thanked him for his advice. I have some work to do to improve some of my images to get to DPAGB standard but this has helped enormously. I have asked him if he will take a look at reworks which he has agreed to do."

It was a disappointment to lose the NEC opportunity but this experience has certainly made up for it."

You will have the opportunity to send your images online to a Volunteer Adviser who will critique them and give you useful advice for improvement. At the sole discretion of the Advisers, you may be able to get back to them, at a later date, for a follow up session when you have improved your images and your entry.

Don't delay. It will be strictly first come, first allocated!



We have quite a number of volunteers but we can use more. If you have the necessary familiarity with the APM and you would like to help us, please get in touch with a very brief APM CV.

Send your request to rod@creative-camera.co.uk with the following information -

- 1 Your name and distinctions already achieved
- 2 Your Club and Federation
- 3 Level being looked at and if you have applied or have been accepted for an Adjudication already
- 4 Can you also mention if your application will be primarily Nature

It will be helpful too, to know if you are applying in Print or PDI although we have no way of looking at your Prints and can only advise on content, rather than the quality of the Print

I will then send you further details about the process and the name and e-mail of a possible Adviser. In the meantime, I would suggest that you should read APM Leaflet 8, especially page 2, which will give you an idea of what to expect

A Country Church by Clive Tanner MPAGB FRPS APAGB

There are interesting country churches throughout England (and in Scotland, Wales and Ireland as well I am sure), these may not always be accessible, but those in the care of Churches Conservation Trust usually are. For me they are a source of wonder and inspiration because in Kent they are quite old, generally unfurnished with many interesting features both architecturally and historically. Each church is looked after, cared for by a local custodian who is very willing to point out and talk about the building.

I find these old churches a wonderful source of photographic opportunity, where time is unimportant; I can make many visits to make up for previous unsuccessful excursions and then gradually build a folio of pleasing images, not necessarily competition pictures but which might be the basis of an exhibition or even self-published book.



Such a church is St Catherine's Church, Kingsdown in Kent. This is described as the only complete Anglican church designed by the Victorian architect Edward Welby Pugin.



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Built in 1866 under the patronage of Lord Kingsdown, it has a needle-sharp spire and richly coloured stained glass. Inside and out, it is a time capsule of Victorian church design that has remained as



Pugin designed it. It was built from Kentish Ragstone, with Bath Stone dressings by Mr. Smith of Ramsgate, where Pugin was brought up. Hardman and Company of Birmingham designed the colourful stained glass. The six Nave windows represent the apostles and have the main figures set into grisaille glass, a Victorian method of obscuring the congregation's view outside.

There are interesting carved stone panels on the Font, the Pulpit and Tympanum over the vestry door. The nave roof is supported by six corbels with angels holding musical instruments which could have been carved by Richard Boulton.



The chancel has stalls with fine carvings of wyverns and martlets, these being family emblems of Pugin and Pemberton Leigh families, with decorated floor tiles by Minton. By daylight the chancel has a 'holy glow' from the red windows, the glass was coloured by the addition of gold during manufacture.

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Although the church is quite small, it is a haven of tranquillity, the pews provide a place to rest and appreciate all the features that Pugin incorporated into this building, one of only three in England for which he designed the interior and exterior.



Many of the photographs which accompany this narrative can be taken with a standard lens and others with a longer lens, all with the camera on a tripod. However, to correct the verticals (saving much extra work in Photoshop) several pictures were taken with perspective control lenses. A number of the pictures are HDR derivatives so that some detail is preserved in the windows.
