
LOOKING AT IMAGES - AN APPROACH TO JUDGING.

A new recorded lecture offered by the PAGB.

At the beginning of the year, Pete Fry asked me to produce an updated Recorded Lecture for the PAGB on Judging. I guess that I do have some experience in this area. I have been Chairman of the WCPF's Judging Panel and have run Judging Seminars for the Federation since 2004. It is often said "accept in haste and repent at leisure" and this certainly proved to be the case!

Lockdown came along and the whole structure of Camera Club life changed radically. New zooming skills needed to be learnt, my print lectures needed to be converted to PDI's and my website had to be updated. I made no progress on the lecture until a gentle nudge from Pete reminded me that I had no real excuse for not starting. It was an ideal lockdown project!

Competitions are the cornerstone of most camera clubs, so there is a constant demand for good judges. Photographic judges often have a reputation for incompetence, an inevitable result perhaps of only having one winner, coupled sometimes with an entrant's high opinion of their own work! Most club members are unaware of the hours and hours of voluntary, unpaid work given by the small



army of judges who exist all over the country. One of the aims of my Recorded Lecture is to explain the judging process to the average camera club competition entrant and to raise their appreciation of all this work.

My second aim is to introduce the art of judging to prospective new judges who need to learn how to address their comments to the 95% of the audience who have not been successful. Hopefully, it will be useful, but it is not intended to replace the vital judge training schemes run by many Federations.

New judges sometimes think all they need to do is discuss the faults of an image. Technical quality is important, but just as important is the emotional content of the image and the effect it has the viewer.

Then the enormity of what I had taken on hit home. I had no experience of using Pictures to Exe or of recording sound and the last time I wrote a script for an AV was back in the days of slides! Where was I going to source the large number of images required to illustrate the talk?

Gradually it all fell into place. A basic script was written, and I was given access to all the accepted images from the WCPF's Members' Exhibition. A local camera club gave me permission to use the images from a competition which I had judged for them and I launched into sound recording and experimentation with PTE.

It was a steep learning curve, and I made a raft of mistakes. Thank goodness for Barry Beckham's "How







Every year the FIAP hold a number of Prestigious Biennial Competitions for its member countries. The PAGB makes an entry on behalf of 'Great Britain and Northern Ireland'

This year we would like to invite you to take part in this selection process for the FIAP Colour Biennial by submitting up to 12 colour images across the following three categories;

- a. Creative Portraits
- b. Minimalism
- c. Humour

The FIAP Biennial Competition is both a Print and PDI Competition, so we would be asking for high resolution versions of your images, if selected for the print entry.

30 Images will be selected in total and all images scoring more than 8 points in the actual FIAP Biennial can be used a part of a FIAP Distinction Application.

Out of the thirty Images we will select and Print 10 for our Print Entry and 20 for our Digital Entry.

Like most countries worldwide, South Africa decided to enforce strict lockdown regulations in March 2020. For 3 months, wildlife reserves and local parks were vacant, enjoyed only by birds and animals. By June 2020, people were allowed to exercise in local nature reserves, so I decided to visit Modderfontein, one of my favourites in Johannesburg. A birder and photographer's paradise!

Having posted my photographs, I received a message from an avid cyclist about a bird attack - his helmet lived to tell the tale. 
because the bird began calling frantically and aggressively flying over me. I identified it as a Black Sparrowhawk (Accipiter Melanoleucus). As I walked slowly onwards, the bird became

am passionate about nature and photography and have been a wildlife photographer since 2011. I am a qualified FGASA field guide based in South Africa and I am currently working for a Photo Safari Company where I setup and lead photographic tours in Africa,

more relaxed and landed near a nest, with two young Sparrowhawks. I understood why the bird was so aggressive towards cyclists - it was protecting its young, like any good parent should.

To take the bike shot, I put on my Ghillie suit. I decided to attempt a high-resolution photo using the Canon 300mm f2.8 MK II with the Canon 1DX, shooting in Manual Mode at 1/2500 of a second to freeze the bird, at f2.8 to give the shot as much light as possible and a shallow depth of field, and ISO 4000 because the forest was relatively dark.

CWM RHONDDA TROPHY COMPETITION

Rhondda Camera Club has for many years organised and hosted a multi-way competition, involving up to 12 clubs meeting at our Club house. This year that was impossible, so when the suggestion was made to use Zoom and expand the competition, the Committee enthusiastically embraced the idea, and the 'Cwm Rhondda Trophy' was born. The hard work started at the beginning of October when it quickly became clear that the competition had to be fed live from Zoom to You Tube. A huge learning curve for everyone on the Committee and it all came together on 14th November 2020.

We welcomed 24 Clubs -14 from Wales, 5 from England, 2 from Northern Ireland and 1 each from Scotland, Ireland and the Isle of Man and the competition was judged by Russell 'Rusty' Lindsay MPAGB, EFIAP FBPE from the East Anglian Federation. The online audience reached nearly 170 and was in the low 160's throughout.

Catchlight Camera Club from Belfast took an early lead when their first image scored 20 points. It was a lead they never lost, dropping only 2 points out of the 80 on offer, and running out worthy winners by 5 points from Gwynfa Camera Club from Llantrisant. Rhondda Camera Club earned a very creditable third place a further 2 points behind.

Rusty chose 'About the Boy' by Laurie Campbell of Catchlight as Best Mono image and 'Social Isolation' by Gwynfryn Jones of Gwynfa as the Best Colour image.

We are discussing holding the competition again next year. Watch this space!


IMPORTANT NEWS FOR APPLICANTS FOR FIAP DISTINCTIONS

Announcement by FIAP on 19th November 2020

Due to problems with the postal services worldwide, caused by Covid-19, FIAP have made the following decisions that will **ONLY** apply to this year's Distinction applications for the 2021 awards.

- For applicants for AFIAP and EFIAP Distinctions, there will be no requirement for acceptances in "print" salons.
- 2. For applications for **MFIAP** in 2021 portfolio submissions will be in high resolution jpeg files only 3,600 pixels on the longest side @ 300ppi.

This information supersedes references to the requirements in any of the previous downloadable documents regarding criteria.


