#### Running a Salon under Covid

Here at Cheltenham Camera Club, we have now judged 2 Salon's under Covid conditions. However, because we only accept PDI and not Prints and because we have such a well-oiled machine, practically the only difference is the judging.

In normal times we have 3 judges per section who travel to Cheltenham to be sequestered in a darkened room with someone operating the judging software. We also have a plethora of support staff who keep us fed and watered. The technical setup is a single computer, a projector, and a voting handset and comfy chair for each judge. It all happens very quickly, judges can make up their mind quickly, generally less than 5 seconds per image. The second part of judging is deciding on the awards from the top-rated pictures. Normally all the top images are shown in a grid or lightbox on the big screen, and the judges can stand, point to images, and discuss them.

Under Covid, our 3 judges and the operator are not, of course, in the same room – in fact because of the requirement to have some judges who are affiliated to an association which is not England – some are not even in the same country. The biggest differences however are that each judge is now responsible for

managing the software on their own computer, the voting software needs to be able to communicate with these machines, and for award giving there needs to be very good communications between the judges. When it came time to start scoring the images it became apparent that while some of the judges had excellent IT skills, some were unable to cope with the fairly frequent glitches that occurred. This of course is not a criticism of the judges, they were chosen for their judging experience not for their software skills. In a normal Salon all they need to be able to do is press a button on a keypad and discuss images – now we're asking them to manage and switch between "Zoom", browsers, "Teamviewer", and to interact

In 2020, Lockdown was declared just 3 weeks before the judging of CISP 2020 was due to start. The club is tremendously grateful to Des, with the assistance of Phil Stapleton, the designer of the Photocomp software, for pulling out all the stops to prevent the cancellation of the Salon.

with a website they've never used before. For some this is water off a duck's back, but for others it's scary and unnerving. The judges were fantastic though! Those with good technical knowledge were very patient, while we sorted things out with those who weren't, and those who struggled, were willing to persevere until we sorted things out. The whole process took much longer than it would have done in normal times; instead of perhaps 15-18 hours in total, it was more like 35 hours, with each of the judging days finishing about 9pm.

After the judging weekend, the remainder of the Salon functions were carried out. Results were emailed, corrections trickled in and were applied, reports were generated and the Catalogue and AV Show were produced, fortunately with very few covid complications.

Finally I would like to sincerely thank all the judges involved in these two Salons - Jennifer Cox, Glyn Edmunds, Pax Garabedian, Adrian Lines, Jane Lines, Pete McCloskey, Michael O'Sullivan, Chris Palmer, Francesco Rizzato, Brian Swinyard and Roy Thomas.





# On the street

Street photography would be more popular if people felt more informed about the legal side, reckons **Damien Demolder**. He updates us, and considers street photography's future

#### The fear

When I visit camera clubs for a street photography talk, one of the first things I ask is, 'Who here shoots street pictures?' Depending on the club, the number of hands that get raised varies from none to a very low number. This puzzled me for a while as I'd been booked to talk about street photography to clubs in which very few photographers were practising it. After a while I tried following that question with 'Who doesn't shoot street but would like to?' – and then the majority of hands would go up. With street photography it seems there's a barrier that prevents people who would really like to go out to shoot from actually doing so. That barrier is fear laced with uncertainty – fear of offending people, and uncertainty about how they stand with the law and ethics.

Those who have been reading Amateur Photography for some time may remember a period in which photographers of all kinds were being stopped by the police when out taking pictures in public. During that time, this magazine, and especially our News Editor Chris Cheesman, worked

very hard with the Home Office and police constables to establish exactly what the law was on taking pictures in public places and ensuring that the message got out to the bobbies on the beat. The fact was that despite there being a heightened terror alert and a general frenzy of suspicion, there were no laws that meant it was illegal for anyone to take pictures of pretty much anything they wanted to. And when that message finally got out photographers were left alone, and largely remain left alone today. And if it is the fear of what the people you are photographing will feel about it, be reassured that if you use common sense they won't even notice you are there.

#### Ethics of street photography

Whatever the rules and the law states we can and can't do, it is more important to make sure we ourselves are happy with our own behaviour. We need to self-regulate to ensure that we don't shoot things, situations and people that leave us feeling uncomfortable or regretful afterwards. The boundaries for this will be different for everyone because we all have different sensitivities –however, the basic premise is that we really want to avoid feeling ashamed of ourselves. For me this means I try not to exploit, make fun of or humiliate anyone. I question myself, and ask, what is motivating me to take this picture. If the answer is anything but pleasant, positive or loving, I don't press the shutter.

#### The legal angle

We spoke to Nick Dunmur, the legal advisor of the Association of Photographers (AOP), for some general advice regarding street photography.

"To be clear from the start, there are no laws in the UK preventing anyone from photographing anything, or indeed anyone else, (including children), in a public place. The issues start with, firstly, defining and understanding what exactly is a "public place" and secondly from the use of



the resulting photographs. One cannot take photographs of things for criminal or terrorist purposes, for example, and one should not use an image of an individual to advertise a product or service without proper permission from that individual (often called a "model release"). 'So, to reiterate, as long as the photographer is on public land or in a public space, then there is nothing stopping them from making a photograph of anything or anyone. It's the resultant use of that photograph that can cause problems."

However, it is worth raising the issue of ethics here too – just because one can do something, does not mean one should. This is particularly pertinent when thinking about photographing people and it is always worth putting oneself in the shoes of the individual(s) about to be photographed and considering, if the roles were reversed, how you would feel.

"Making photos of people on private land is a different matter. One might be allowed to make photos in a private space but because there is in effect always some sort of contract between you and the private space you are in you will always have to comply with requests for you to stop. If you don't, you may find yourself in breach of the terms and conditions of that space. In short, it will be at the discretion of the owners of the private land or space that you are in."

"Even though a photographer may be on public land if the subject is in a place where a person has a reasonable expectation of privacy, such as inside their home, making a photograph of them might be a breach of privacy law, such as it exists in the UK. Privacy law in the UK is mostly a combination of the Human Rights Act 1998 (which incorporates the European Convention on Human Rights) and case law (individual court cases which establish precedents for how a court may view or determine an action). As far as buildings and other property is concerned, buildings are protected by copyright, just as other artistic works are, so whilst it is not illegal to make a photograph of a building that is on public display, due to an exception in s.62 of the Copyright, Designs & Patents Act 1988 (the bit of law that governs intellectual property such as copyright), it may be that the building is also trade-marked, which would prevent the photographer from using that image to promote another brand, service or product. It should be clear that whilst the making of a photograph is, generally speaking, free from any encumbrance, the use of that photograph is something that needs to be considered carefully."



Barbara Lawton, who passed away in August 2021, was a natural history photographer of exceptional talent. She was a member of Smethwick Photographic Society for over




