WHY EVERY SERIOUS PHOTOGRAPHER SHOULD OWN A PRINTER AND USE IT **BOB GOODE** ARPS EFIAPS

In this digital world where images proliferate and our exposure to them swells at an exponential rate, we see a mirrored decline in the value of each image. They flash on our screen for a few short



seconds and are gone - increasingly seen but never viewed. Whether we loathe or adore the image and the message that it holds, we are restricted in our opportunity to absorb it, a trend which I think needs to be reversed.

Don't get me wrong, digital imagery has had a profoundly positive impact on amateur photography, driving down cost and raising new possibilities. Remember the days when the only option for the amateur to exhibit their work was to entrust the original Kodachrome or a slightly inferior copy to the vagaries of a postal service. Now we can have exact facsimiles of our images in exhibitions across the globe in a matter of seconds without fear of loss of the original. (I am not in this article going down the rabbit hole of how to keep images safe in the digital world.)

Producing a fine digital image is a demanding art – though not for many, one that can ever be as satisfying as watching the moment of creation in a developing solution

- and brings with it technical challenges that in the hands of a skilled practitioner allow the production of stunning pictures of truly superb quality. The print however might be said to represent

the polar opposite of the digital image. It is a thing to be held, caressed and studied, even meditated upon. A fine object appreciated for the

tonal qualities it possesses almost as much as the message it conveys. It brings a whole new set of technical challenges such as matching the printed image to the original seen on the screen, selecting the correct paper to exactly compliment the image and ensuring that, however it is displayed, the image is precisely what you intended.

By only ever showing our work as digital images we waste so much that our cameras and processes have to offer. We lust for the latest 60-megapixel image sensor yet reduce this to 2 megapixels for the most important moment when we unveil our work for all to see. and so squander detail, definition, sharpness, tonality and opportunity. The print worker ensures that the viewer gets the benefit of all 60 million of those luscious pixels and retains control of the way their image will be seen.

When I visit an exhibition, I often find a sense of dissatisfaction after the PDI showing, having

been viewed images for the obligatory five seconds. I only have those same few seconds to absorb the nuances of an image which gives me goosebumps or sets off a profound train of thought. When I walk around the walls of a print salon I am free to study each print for as long as my heart dictates. search for the photographers meaning and revel in their imagination. https://www.stourportcameraclub.com/blank

MY EXPERIENCE OF APPLYING FOR A CPAGB AWARD BY OLIVIA COSTELLO

Following an Awards for Photographic Merit Zoom presentation to the Northern Counties in January, I decided to begin the process of applying for my CPAGB.

I work at advanced level in Saltburn Photographic Society and do reasonably well in club competitions so I felt that I was possibly not too far off that level.

In the first instance I contacted the NCPF Awards Secretary, Gerald Chamberlin DPAGB, EFIAP. Gerald rang me a couple of days later to explain the next steps. He sent me the required forms and explained the process. Mentors are available through the PAGB to help applicants to achieve the required standard but Gerald was kind enough to mentor me himself.

The next step was to choose a selection of my best images and send them to him. He then arranged a zoom tutorial for me, during which he went through my images, suggesting those that were worth working on for my application. I really enjoyed that meeting and Gerald explained clearly what needed to be done to each potentially successful image to reach the standard needed for my submission. He also spent time making sure I knew how to do the work that was required.

I felt really enthusiastic after that and set to work on my images. Some needed only a little bit of tweaking but in a way that made a significant difference. Sometimes the difference between an image worthy of a Yes vote and that getting a Near Miss or No can be very small. For others it was easier to go back to the original RAW file and for one I felt it was better to retake it.

I have completed and sent off all the forms and am registered for the November Adjudication in Northern Ireland. Wish me luck!

You may not be able to see a lot of difference at this scale.

Just a very small crop and a slight opening of the shadows, but this could make all the difference in the Adjudicators' votes.

PIGS MIGHT FLY



e-news 304, published on 1 April, received a healthy response from concerned readers.

In particular the article suggesting amendments to the criteria for entering Nature and Wildlife pictures to PAGB competitions in order to avoid images of violence or violent behaviour, generated several e-mails to your Editor and some heated debate on Social Media.

It's madness as a wildlife photographer I capture all aspects of nature, the full life cycle. Those who object to cycle of life images, should avoid looking at them, rather than getting them banned. It is not violence it is survival. For me leave the wild life photography alone.

COMMENT There are a great number of people I believe who think that any form of violence is a distasteful subject for photography, even amongst birds and animals. This behaviour becomes more prevalent in April as Spring draws on.

REPLY You mean Townies, in the worst possible meaning of the word. People who want to pretend the world, and nature, is twee and nice and that nothing can be allowed to illustrate the stupidity of that idea.

I'm deleting all of my nature images as we speak.

Oh, 12 o'clock. I'm restoring all my nature images as we speak

I'm sorry but if this isn't some form of joke then it is "wokery" gone crazy. Will food photography featuring meat be banned because it might offend Vegans

"Distasteful?' Or do we mean divorced from reality? By the same logic do we ban images from war and conflict zones? How would humanity ever learn from the mistakes and atrocities of the past? Oh, wait...

Nature guidelines. I am a little surprised to see such a "rule change". Personally I am not sure if I agree or disagree with concept of the change (is it PC going mad??). But what I am more concerned with is, if you look at images submitted in a nature category in a typical International Salon / exhibition and even PAGB / Federation comps, how many accepted images will be left after you remove all the images of Carnivores catching / eating prey, Birds and other animals feeding on carrion, no more Bears fishing (if successful), no Ospreys carrying fish or hunting. What will be left - how consistent will the no fights including play behaviour - no Hares boxing? No inflight squabbles of small birds?..... What about birds eating or catching insects to feeding chicks - Hoopoe at a nest hole for example or a bird with a bug in its beak? If as is currently the case animals need to exhibit behaviour and interaction to stand out when judged - what's left? Also. does this just mean that these images will migrate to an Open category, where the rules do not exist?

Many of you will be relieved and some may be disappointed that neither the PAGB AGM, nor the EC meeting which followed it, considered the need to adopt these new Nature criteria. You may wish to conclude that the PAGB is not yet completely "Woke", although in my senior years as an EC member I have sometimes needed waking. You may also wish to conclude that the PAGB could be appreciative of the occasional natural violence, perhaps as an antidote to tedious debate.

Other comments.

I feel that there needs to be comment about repositioning Doncaster into the Scottish Federation for spurious historic reasons. If the YPU is in difficulty and member clubs need to find another federation, Doncaster would be welcomed into the KCPA. After all, they are closer to Kent than the wilds of Scotland, travel is much easier, there would be no customs, immigration or financial checks nor would there be any language barrier. The KCPA would also welcome Scottish clubs after a short period of acclimatisation and assimilation.

Being from Doncaster, I may have to accept the legal justification for Scottish domination, but I believe that in York they are still permitted by ancient law to shoot Scots with a bow and arrow!

Do the PAGB safety pants come in other colours? I would like to order some brown pairs, with the PAGB logo, front and centre.

The president of the renowned Doncaster C.C. is from my home town Port Talbot. Does this give the WPF any opportunity to share their better images with Scotland?


