#### REVISED COMPETITION RULE

The subject of Plagiarism has occupied the PAGB for some time and it was found that most of our competitions had a different version of the same rule. The following has been adopted for the APM and all PAGB competitions and Federations and Clubs are recommended to adopt it for their own competitions.

"Images entered must be entirely the work of the photographer. Composite images are permitted provided all component images meet this requirement."

It is impossible to compile a rule that covers everything but we are simply asking for the application of commonsense. You are not permitted to use someone else's work and pretend that it is your own. It is OK for example to photograph a poster and incorporate it in your picture provided it is still obvious that it is a poster by another person. It is not permissible to incorporate your photographs into a poster and hide the fact that you did not produce that poster, or indeed hide the fact that it is a poster. For the avoidance of doubt, use of images from any other source including, but not limited to, royalty free image banks and clipart are not permitted. It is generally accepted that frames, filters and other image manipulation tools will not contravene the rule. Although not officially adopted as PAGB policy, Christine Widdal L&CPU, has written an excellent article on what constitutes plagiarism and this will be available shortly on the PAGB Website.

## **AWARDS FOR PHOTOGRAPHIC MERIT**

#### CACC \* LEIGHTON BUZZARD \* 16 & 17 APRIL 2011

The CACC did a great job hosting the PAGB Awards for Photographic Merit and we are grateful to the entire team. Prints were assessed at Credit, Distinction and Master level and PDI at Credit and Distinction. There were 5 applications for MPAGB with one success. Congratulations to -

## DAVE BOWEN MPAGB Tamworth P.C. MCPF

Dave becomes one of only 112 people to be awarded the MPAGB since the APM began in 1994. The standard is defined as "the best of UK amateur photography" and photographs likely to win awards in Open Exhibitions are required to achieve the pass mark. The entry is 20 prints scored by six judges marking between two and five and an average of over 22 per photograph is required to pass.

Very few people have the depth of good work needed to succeed at this level and few clubs have more than one MPAGB. It can only be a matter of time before Tamworth PC has another.

As usual there was a very satisfactory level of success at Credit Level, (Good Club Photography), with 33 Passes in Prints and 6 in PDI and it was a particular pleasure to see so many people present to receive their badges.

The DPAGB is judged at a higher standard and a lower pass rate is to be expected. What was not entirely expected was the poor technical quality of some of the Distinction PDI. Many suffered from blocked up shadow detail, burnt out highlights and over sharpening leading to visible haloes. We check our projection set up very carefully and we are satisfied that it was as good as our current technology allows. A later check of many of the images in Photoshop confirmed that there was a disappointing number with the histogram cruelly clipped at both ends. You are strongly advised to check this for yourself before entering and to ensure that you see the pictures projected on a properly calibrated and colour managed projector. Poor technical quality was not of course the only reason for poor scores.

14 DPAGB were awarded in Prints and 2 in PDI and a full list can be found on the following pages. If you were unsuccessful please try again and, if possible, try to get to an APM workshop. Most Federations organise these from time to time - ask your Federation Awards Officer. I will try to commission an article on how to prepare your photographs as PDI and the pitfalls to avoid.

Later in this e-news you will find a compilation of all the passes at each level since the first APM Adjudication in 1994 and you can check out the Federations and Clubs who have achieved the most.

#### **Crunching Numbers**

The PAGB team received a three comments on the Saturday and I have received an e-mail since saying that the scores given by the judges for the Distinction Prints on the Saturday were lower after the first break.

It is not unusual for entrants to put their best photographs at the start and finish of their submission with their least favoured photographs in the middle. So this incidence of declining scores in the middle of the run might not be unusual. However this is the first time that anyone has remarked on it so I have analysed the scores.

The average score per photograph over the first 7 Distinction Prints was 16.6 and at that point 15 people were on course to pass. The average score per photograph over the final 8 Distinction Prints was 22.6 giving an overall average of 19.8 per photograph. Some entrants came up and some went down. Some scored well over the 300 points required, some fell well short and by the end 14 were successful. I'm not sure what this tells you but I'm always interested in the numbers.

#### Far and Away

It is particularly pleasing to note that virtually every Federation is represented by a successful applicant and many of the most far flung were present to receive their badges. My feeling was that more people than usual had made the journey and this is something the excellent CACC Hosts should take pride in.

#### **Consistent Marking**

We thank one entrant for this interesting note. "I thought you and the judges would be interested to know that the marking was really consistent with what I achieved last time when I failed. I used the best marked pictures again and the marking was remarkably similar and from eight images there was only a total difference of two points 177v179 which I thought was really good." I'm impressed too! A swing up to 6 points per image is quite possible with very slight differences of (6) opinions.

#### A STORY OF ONE CPAGB AWARD DAVID RAYNER CPAGB

"How it *feels* to gain your CPAGB award; that's what I'd like a few words on," said the e-news editor. I was caught off guard and agreed – this is a précis of the result.

The truth is it felt rather different at various stages. 'What a good idea. This could be interesting to try; and a challenge too', was how it felt at the beginning. I thought I'd need to improve my photography, but that would be interesting too. To start with, I checked with our PAGB Awards Officer, to see if I had gained enough points from exhibiting in the Members' Exhibitions and yes, I had, so I could apply to the PAGB. 'Great, this was beginning to grow on me.'

'So, how hard would it be?' A Credit PAGB Award is supposed to represent a level that would do well in 'average' club activities and I'd had a few shown here and there, so some of my photographs would surely do OK 'Or would they? I'd need 10 good ones, not just a few,' I reminded myself. 'Time to try to find out just what 'average' meant.'

I started my research by spending a day at a PAGB print Adjudication. Six assessors marked each randomly-presented print with 2 to 5 marks and only the aggregate score was announced. A total score of 200 for 10 prints gains a pass, and with scores for each print frequently falling between 16 and 25 I began to realise that more people were going to pass than fail. By the end of the day I'd learned a lot. I'd seen individual prints marked to the standard (20) and seen some really good ones too. I'd seen ones that failed as well; and I'd also seen how the Adjudicators looked closely at nature prints and record shots for detail. Good nature photos often did well, I noticed, 'Hmm! I'm not good at nature'.

Many atmospheric or 'different' subjects did well but well-worn subjects often did poorly, as did landscapes, unless they had that special ingredient. As people collected their prints at the end of the day I looked closely at some of their work – the quality was very high. 'They are all winners; this is going to be so hard!' But then some had been marked poorly, and these were often inferior to my work. 'Perhaps I could do it!' I made the decision to send off for an application immediately. 'A year, they'd said; that's so long to wait. But then, a year will give me time to make some exciting images!'

A July morning brought a bit of serendipity, I happened upon a dragonfly emerging from my garden pond and I spent hours laying on a plank recording each stage of its emergence from the nymph form to a drying-out dragonfly. 'Yes! Now I had a good nature photo!'

Over the year I put together over 20 prints, many of them entirely new, and I started to rate them using CPAGB portfolios seen on the Internet. I began to realise maybe I'd not tried hard enough. 'But perhaps I'll just scrape through', I calculated. One or two prints were particularly good and these would hopefully carry the portfolio. I reprinted and remounted everything, and a camera club friend helped me pick the best 10 prints, so I would not be too biased by older or more recent work.

Come the day, I'm sitting again behind a row of Adjudicators, copy entry form and pencil in hand waiting for my first print to come up. People around me are scribbling their marks down. 'Where is my first print?' Suddenly, it's there on the stand and I'd hardly noticed! 17 points are awarded 'Oh No! - So Low!' But I'd deliberately put my worst print first - so it should get better. And for a while it did, the next print alone balanced the books by earning 23, then as the minutes turned into hours my surplus points edged away until my last print could either make or break me. The chap next to me had given up already and there were glum faces elsewhere. Abruptly, my last print appeared and I knew I'd passed. 'Whew! - There would be no waiting for a marginal points review for me!'

There were 36 entries at Credit level and only 18 of us passed; far fewer than I remembered from a year earlier. I felt proud and honoured when I was presented with my little blue badge at the end of the day. It had certainly all been worth it. I'd learnt a lot, enjoyed it all and amazingly, my nature print had scored a wonderful 28. 'Hmm! Perhaps I'll do some more nature in future!'



#### REVISED PAGB MILEAGE RATE

#### HOW MUCH DO LECTURERS AND JUDGES PAY TO VISIT YOUR CLUB?

You might think this question makes no sense but the judges and lecturers on the PAGB list visit lots of clubs every year and most of them are out of pocket most of the time. These people give up their time, their energy and their expertise but, because they seldom claim sufficient expenses, they also subsidise your club! Many only charge for petrol and ignore their considerably increased costs for maintenance, servicing, tyres, depreciation and sometimes insurance for the hundreds, or even thousands, of extra miles they do.

The PAGB Standard rate will be raised from the date of issue of the next Handbook to a still modest 30p per mile plus petrol but how many visitors will claim that much and how many clubs will pay it.? You will note from the table below that even assuming a price of £1.30 per litre and 40 mpg the correct rate to claim is 45p! (How many can get 40 mpg and how many can buy at £1.30 per litre?)

Our advice to those on the PAGB and Federation lists is PLEASE charge a sensible amount. If you don't you are robbing yourself and you are making it difficult for the next visitor who wants to charge his/her proper expenses. Our plea to Clubs is to look at the distance your lecturer has come and, if the amount requested is inadequate, PLEASE INSIST on paying him/her not less than 45 pence per mile. Your advance question should not be "what will your expenses be?" but "what is your estimated mpg and do you have other expenses?" Why should they pay so that your members can have their fees reduced?
