AWARDS FOR PHOTOGRAPHIC MERIT, NOVEMBER 2015 IN WALES

Famous Dave is working on a special Ask Dave Special so if you have any questions unanswered write in soon.

Question 1. Hi Dave . I have a DPAGB in Prints but to go for an MPAGB/AV it looks like I need a DPAGB/AV. Do I have to apply over again at the DPAGB/AV level?

Answer 1. In the more recent APM/AV reincarnation the PAGB has decided to designate its Awards for Photographic Merit in Audio Visual as CPAGB/AV, DPAGB/AV and MPAGB/AV and this has not been universally popular. However it is an entirely different, in many ways more demanding, discipline and the PAGB now think it fair to distinguish the AV Awards, which they didn't do before.

However, the PAGB consider that the DPAGB in any medium qualifies you to apply for the MPAGB in any medium. Unless you are very sure, you are strongly advised to take expert advice to be certain that your work is at the correct level"

Question 2. Dave. Why don't the PAGB say who the judges are for their competitions? I couldn't find a note of the GB Trophy Judges anywhere and it is quite annoying.

Answer 2. I have spoken with the organisors of the GB Trophy and they admitted that they hadn't listed the judges anywhere or published the names in e-news. This was just an oversight and usually the names for all PAGB competitions are published in e-news well in advance and sometimes they appear in the Rules or the Invitation to enter.

But why do you need these names? I guess you think that you can then tailor your entry to suit the judges listed? Most experienced entrants will tell you that this is largely a fruitless exercise and Dave agrees. Just because the individual judge has given a picture a high, or a low, mark in one competition doesn't mean that the same thing will happen in another competition.

The photograph will be up against a whole different range of pictures, perhaps of much better quality or, whisper it quietly, the judge might just change his/her mind. In any case, in competitions like the GB Trophy, the judge is only one of three and the other two judges may not agree.





There were 52 YPU club members in attendance at the Annual Keighley Day held on 14 November in Pontefract.

The audience were professionally educated and entertained by Bob and Sue Moore in the morning and by Adrian and Jane Lines in the afternoon. Bob and Sue had the audience spellbound, with their A2 prints and anecdotes of their globetrotting adventures.

In the afternoon, Adrian and Jane inspired the audience with a demonstration of how they produced the images used in their recent successful MPAGB submissions.

Howard Tate, who organised the event, reports that every single person who spoke to him expressed nothing but praise for the presentations. Bob Moore even gave a demonstration of his, now famous, 360° panoramas, photographing the assembled and eager audience ^{see below}.

A few years ago the YPU sold the Keighley Collection to the National Media Museum and the monies realised were invested so that the income can be used to subsidise the Keighley Days. With current interest rates, income is now minimal and the fund is becoming depleted. However, this is the first time for many years that the event has made a profit, thanks in large part to the speakers who attracted such a large audience.

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POLICE

Photography advice

We encourage officers and the public to be vigilant against terrorism but recognise the importance not only of protecting the public from terrorism but also promoting the freedom of the public and the media to take and publish photographs.

Guidance around the issue has been made clear to officers and PCSOs through briefings and internal communications. The following advice is available to all officers and provides a summary of the Metropolitan Police Service's guidance around photography in public places.

Members of the public and the media do not need a permit to film or photograph in public places and police have no power to stop them filming or photographing incidents or police personnel.

Terrorism Act 2000 Photography and Section 44 of the Terrorism Act 2000. The power to stop and search someone under Section 44 of the Terrorism Act 2000 no longer exists. Police continue to have the power to stop and search anyone who they reasonably suspect to be a terrorist under Section 43 of the Terrorism Act.

Officers have the power to stop and search a person who they reasonably suspect to be a terrorist. The purpose of the stop and search is to discover whether that person has in their possession anything which may constitute evidence that they are a terrorist.

Officers have the power to view digital images contained in mobile telephones or cameras carried by a person searched under S43 of the Terrorism Act 2000 to discover whether the images constitute evidence that the person is involved in terrorism. Officers also have the power to seize and retain any article found during the search which the officer reasonably suspects may constitute evidence that the person is a terrorist. This includes any mobile telephone or camera containing such evidence.

Officers do not have the power to delete digital images or destroy film at any point during a search. Deletion or destruction may only take place following seizure if there is a lawful power (such as a court order) that permits such deletion or destruction.

Section 58A of the Terrorism Act 2000 covers the offence of eliciting, publishing or communicating information about members of the armed forces, intelligence services or police where the information is, by its very nature, designed to provide practical assistance to a person committing or preparing an act of terrorism.

Any officer making an arrest for an offence under Section 58A must be able to demonstrate a reasonable suspicion that the information was, by its very nature, designed to provide practical assistance to a person committing or preparing an act of terrorism.

It would ordinarily be unlawful to use section 58A to arrest people photographing police officers in the course of normal policing activities, including protests because there would not normally be grounds for suspecting that the photographs were being taken to provide assistance to a terrorist. An arrest would only be lawful if an arresting officer had a reasonable suspicion that the photographs were being taken in order to provide practical assistance to a person committing or preparing an act of terrorism.

There is nothing preventing officers asking questions of an individual who appears to be taking photographs of someone who is or has been a member of Her Majesty's Forces (HMF), Intelligence Services or a constable so long as this is being done for a lawful purpose and is not being done in a way that prevents, dissuades or inhibits the individual from doing something which is not unlawful.

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The PAGB will once again have a Stand at the Photography Show




