

When it dawned on me that I was missing out on half of the competition rounds because I only took part with PDI, I sought refuge in the sanctity of

The learning curve was steep. Who knew there was so much more to it than just clicking the print button!? Next followed a few years of exploring the world of printing, with its heady mix of extremes; cheap paper and compatible inks, branded ink, refillable flow systems, technical profiles and outrageously priced posh papers! We found our

comfort zone and "go-to affordables" and, when lockdown struck and home deliveries applied to everything, I found we had stocks in place to print, time at home to spend on creating new images... and then the Masters of Print opened for entries.

For the first time I had the opportunity to give it a go. More than aware of its prestige status, I never thought I would actually get anything accepted, but it was the taking part that was the joy.

I am delighted to have earned a much-acclaimed badge at my first time of entering and hope the

## Tony Davies PAGB EC member from the NWPA

When Rod asked the PAGB executive members to write something about themselves for e-news, my first thought was where to start. Eventually I figured out the best place was at the beginning, and with a photo!

The picture below was taken in September 1968 from the beach at Achmelvich in Scotland whilst I was on a cycling holiday. The reason for including it here, is that it won the Newport Phoenix Cycling Club, Junior Photo Competition, that year. At the time I was using a Pentax camera, I can't remember the model, but I do remember it had a screw thread to attach a 50mm lens.





Skip forward a few years and I was working in Saudi Arabia where my photography ground to a halt for far too many years.

I was away for four months at a stretch and there was nowhere to keep film cool, let alone get it developed,


I stopped taking photos after my first

For this article though, I have searched back through my slide boxes and found this photo which was taken on the road between Dammam and Al-Hufuf in 1975.

I spent eleven years in the middle east in this period of expatriate life. Saudi Arabia, Algeria, Iraq and then back to Saudi Arabia.

The next twenty years were spent in the UK. Firstly, North Cotes near Grimsby then Newport south Wales, my birth town, and latterly in north Wales where I still live. Soon after I arrived in

north Wales, I joined the Great Orme Exploration Society and helped with the exploration and surveying of the labyrinth of passageways under the Great Orme. Some of these workings date back to the Bronze Age, 1760BC being the earliest carbon date we have.

I finally ended up working overseas again. Firstly, in Afghanistan at Camp Bastion in Helmond Province. This photo is of the hospital in its initial stages of construction.

After Afghanistan I moved on to Iraq and finally ended my working career in Mozambique.

During my time in Mozambique I decided that I needed a hobby to keep me occupied when I stopped work. Photography was the obvious choice and I joined the RPS whilst still an expatriate.

The Pier in Llandudno where I now live with my wife; Ali, was, and still is, one of my favourite photos from the start of my new foray into digital photography.



I finally retired in March 2015 and joined Conwy Camera Club. Since then I have been fully involved, becoming the External Exhibitions Secretary for the club. I have entered many national and international salons and joined the Global Photographic Union where I currently serve as the GPU UK Representative, GPU Licence Officer and a GPU Governing Board Member.

Prior to the pandemic I was asked by the NWPA if I would be willing to serve on the PAGB Executive as Christine Langford's replacement. I have now attended three in person meetings and a number of Zoom meetings of the Executive and by the time this little introduction is published in e-news I should be the PAGB Patronage Sub-Committee Chairman, replacing Roy Thomas who has now retired from the PAGB EC after more than 30 years of service.

I have no idea what will come next in this life's journey.

During Christmas 2020 it became obvious the nation was heading back into lockdown and the thought of having to spend another three months confined to the house was affecting me deeply.

To take my mind off the situation, I decided to give myself a new photography challenge, entering different competitions, outside of the camera club world.

I am mostly known for my creative images, and one of the largest fine art competitions in the world is FAPA. Looking through previous winners, I realised that the images were very different to those that normally do well in camera club competitions. One of the categories was for a series of photographs and that really appealed to me. As my photography has matured it's gone from merely pretty pictures to those containing strong stories and it's easier to get a message across using more than one image.

I spent three months creating my first ever series, which I called 'Solitary Confinement'. But it wasn't confinement of people, but pets. A written statement had to accompany the series which is given equal weight to the photographs.



Nobody was more surprised than me to have my work awarded in my first ever entry into FAPA, with my series being nominated in the Amateur Photomanipulation category.

During the Autumn of 2021, I began work on a new series for entry into this year's FAPA contest and I decided on the theme of "Blood Sports", again with a twist. I thought that it told a powerful story, but I was convinced it would be too controversial for inclusion. I didn't even note the date that the winners would be announced and I was bowled over to receive the email telling me my series had again been nominated for an award!

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




# Photography Show



#### **INTER-CLUB PDI AND PRINT CHAMPIONSHIPS**

Starting with the 2022 Championships it has been decided that, in addition to the Finalists each year, the Winner of the Plate Competition will now qualify to be invited to participate in the same competition in the following year.

This will be in addition to the two Clubs nominated by each Federation. Those Clubs participating in the Plate Round at each Championship will now need to provide 8 images, chosen from their Image Bank and no more than 4 of these images may have been used in Rounds One and Two.

Belfast Exposed presents the exhibition "Seen To Be Heard" by award-winning photographer Jennifer Willis, featuring 32 portraits of women from Northern Ireland all living with a Secondary Breast Cancer diagnosis.

Jennifer started this project 6 months ago in her Belfast Studio and brought together 16 women, diagnosed with Secondary Breast Cancer. They have united in their passion to educate people on the need for Secondary Cancer Care services to be changed. Willis has created raw and captivating portraits of these women who bravely bare their scars and also portray their everyday lives.

This exhibition is part of the NI Mental Health Arts Festival, running from the 9th - 25th May. This festival aims to create a platform for high-quality artwork that deals compassionately and intelligently with mental health. A series of talks will be delivered focusing on the issues contained within the *Seen to Be Heard* project.

Through the development of this exhibition, hearts and minds have already been affected in local government.

Brought together, the exhibition reflects the trauma and courage of those who are living daily with a Secondary Breast Cancer diagnosis and is a creative response to what is considered an

inequality in women's healthcare for Secondary Breast Cancer in Northern Ireland. The exhibition sheds light on these issues as an appeal to politicians and medical people to act, and to support those with Secondary Breast Cancer. In Wales and England, the Government provides treatment, care and check-ups which isn't offered in Northern Ireland.

"This has been a very special project to work on and one of the most important exhibitions Belfast Exposed has done. Jennifer's talent is evident through the raw and evocative portraits of the women. Through these works and the manifesto, Seen To Be Heard exemplifies how art can be used to educate and becomes a bridge to deal with difficult topics." ~ Deirdre Robb, Chief Executive.

Save your best print, or two, for the MASTERS OF PRINT, you can always use them later in exhibitions.
